

2019 saw the commencement of the Early Learning Centre (ELC), which marked the first stage in our College's Master Plan development. A wide range of expertise enables the provision of quality and challenging programs across all learning areas. The majority of teaching staff have more than ten years relevant teaching experience. To enhance learning support at Mandurah Baptist College, the College has invested in support staff and in providing opportunities for whole staff training.

Management of non-attendance:

- Teachers mark the attendance register twice daily in the Primary School and in every class during the day in the Secondary School. Correspondence received explaining student absences is recorded on the attendance register.
- Text messages are sent daily to parents if no contact has been made with the school. Replies to daily text messages explaining student absences are recorded on the attendance register.
- On a weekly basis, follow-up contact (letter/email) is made if no written explanation of the absence has been received from the parent/guardian.
- Students who have failed to attend (without notification) after 4 days are personally followed up by the Receptionist/Deputy Principal/Principal through parent meetings, including home visits as necessary.
- A small number of compulsory events are required by students as part of the MBC community. Attendance is taken at these events.
- Support is available to families who experience attendance issues via the Student Support team.



Student Achievement

Mandurah Baptist College recognises exceptional student achievements in 2019.

- A Top ATAR Score of 98.8
- 74.6% of students gained their first preference to university (total for WA - 67.4%)
- 93.0% offered place at university (total for WA - 92.5%)
- Out of 25 subjects:
 - 'School Moderated Mean' – 14 subjects above the state;
 - 'School Exam Mean' – 13 subjects (or components) above state;
 - 'School Standardised Course Combined Score' – 11 subjects above state
- Two MBC courses identified in the 'schools with highest performing students in Year 12 ATAR courses' list – Visual Arts & Literature
- Four students received Certificates of Distinction and 10 students received Certificates of Merit
- 51 students completed 83 VET qualifications during Year 11-12

The Secondary School is very proud of the students' individual progress and recognises students who achieve at a high level annually.

Secondary students (Years 11-12) who achieve over 80% for assessments are acknowledged with a Club 80 certification, and in 2019 over 930 certificates were issued. Additionally, a total of 136 Certificates of Academic Merit, Distinction or High Distinction were given out across both semesters for students who achieved at least 1 grade at an 'A' level in a WACE course in Semester 1 or 2 grades at an 'A' level in a WACE course in Semester 2.

In the Lower School (Years 7-10) a total of 251 Certificates of Academic Merit, Distinction or High Distinction were given out across both semesters to students who achieved at least 5 grades at 'A' level.







Why did you choose MBC for your child? (Select all that apply)






Please rate overall communication from the College?
